A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

Resurrection: Open Tomb

Luke 24:12

¹² Peter, however, got up and ran to the tomb. Bending over, he saw the strips of linen lying by themselves, and he went away, wondering to himself what had happened.

With all due respect to Christmas, and the flashiest birth announcement ever....Easter is Our Story...it is nearly THE story, second only in magnitude to the Cross...but without one simple detail might have been ignored. What detail? The tomb.

In our day and age, vaults are normally not seen, but are often part of a the final resting place of our earthly bodies.

They aren't legally required, but are often mandated by cemetaries as a protective barrier for the casket that is beautiful, but incapable of standing the test of time for the elements pressing in on all sides.

The casket is intended to keep the outside world out...the vault essentially guarantees it.

The only reason the tomb was able to shine a spotlight on the cross was due to people on the outside being

able to see IN, despite a stone rolled in place to block the entrance, and despite armed guards intended to GUARANTEE the outside world could not interfere with death's "finished" work.

Incredibly, the story does not end with a tomb sealed shut, but standing wide open, awaiting humanity's eyes to see God's glory shining from a tomb that was once filled, but having been opened up now shines God's light on the cross that was occupied by the Savior of the world, and never would, and never could perform that task again. I am speaking in metaphore, for though Matthew's Gospel speaks of the dazzling array of the angel who rolled the stone away, nothing is shared in Scripture about literal light from within the tomb. It took quite a while for the disciples to catch the full understanding of the events they witnessed, or ran from.

Their stories could not have been told as they have been

told for generations....if they had never looked inside a tomb previously occupied... but then empty.

This is not a lesson restricted to the disciples in the past. Multiple Scripture passages in the New Testament speak to the journey all Christians share with Christ, that journey from death into life.

Ephesians 2:5-5 But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions-- it is by grace you have been saved.

All who have accepted God's gift of Grace and forgiveness through Jesus Christ make the journey from death to life, but


like the disciples, WE are given the privilege of looking into the tombs that formerly contained our corpses, but having walked out of those tombs of self-love, of various sins, we now are able to look into those tombs and ourselves ponder the magnificence of the cross. I believe it is N.T. Wright who wrote that Christ's coronation, the crowning moment of the King of

wrote that Christ's coronation, the crowning moment of the King of kings and the Lord of lords was NOT the ascension into heaven, seated at the right hand of the Father, and not at the Resurrection, walking out of the borrowed tomb, but was on cross of Calvary's hill, when he willingly chose to die as THE sacrifice for ALL sin.

I somewhat unapologetically need to tell you some of what is on this page may be heard again on Easter Sunday. Generally speaking, I am not fond of repeating myself, but in this case, the story of the cross and the tomb is not just Jesus' story, it is our story, too.

While remembering my journey from death into life, and inviting you to do the same, I am,

JoAnn has completed the required year end reports for the West Ohio Conference. An attempt is being made for an urban mission context for the summer mission trip. Norman has provided a great help in finding a couple connection faults in monitor cables which were preventing the Praise Band from hearing themselves.

Projector Upgrade in A-C.

Between meetings the Board approved funds from Revitalization to be used by Pastor Robbie toward the opportunity to purchase a used projector. It is twice the power of our current projector and should fulfill the needs of the upcoming Simulcast and future special events (there were hopes of rental options, but no reasonably priced options with enough power were found). If registration funds surpass the cost of the event, those will go toward reimbursing the Revitalization fund.

Finance Report

The 2018 audit has been completed. It is normal for January financials to be rough due to lower attendance, extra bills for snow removal, as well as annual bills that fall in January. There was a "loss" of over \$4,000 in January, but the income, incredibly, was only \$1,000 under the budget goal, and the expenses were similar to previous years.

The devotions will be led by Les Trittschuh in March, and by Katie Poling in April.

The meeting ended with the serving of Holy Communion and in prayer, that whatever was decided at General Conference, our congregation at Hoffman continue to be one body, even as we share from one loaf.


