



A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR Perseverance Under Trial

James 1:12 Blessed is the man who perseveres under trial, because when he has stood the test, he will receive the crown of life that God has promised to those who love him.

There seems to come a point when words fail us. The longer this global virus has been with humanity, the more we are at a loss to talk "around" it. I found myself the other evening silently counting how many times I was hearing particular wordings in commercials, whether I would hear "these unprecedented times" or "these uncertain times," or some other wording that talks around what we are collectively enduring, all while

staying nice and polite and upbeat.

The picture you see on the page was taken the morning of April 21, just after the quick snow that disappeared nearly as quickly as it appeared. I walked around the block to take a few pictures of beauty peeking from beneath the congregations of snowflakes. I liked the contrast of the color vs the stark white snow, but found myself gravitating to this more

"plain" photograph. A few blades of grass, standing in a row, having wriggled, squeezed and adapted their way through a crack in the sidewalk, and for what reward? To be stepped on, snowed on, and eventually, mowed off. Despite the fate awaiting them, these blades of grass stood resolute....even proud, if I may be so bold.

I'm sure there is a point in which the weight of the snow could have been too much for these wispy blades of grass, but before that time came, the sun came out, and the snow melted away. I have heard several express in our culture and community over the last year that they are so "done" with all the various protective measures. It is our way of just saying we are fed up. Many years ago I was in my 4th year of working retail during Christmas rush and I decided I was "done" with retail. The next year I was employed elsewhere. I have heard similar statements made by those going through chemo or radiation treatments, that they are so "done" with this…yet they keep on going. This is because the choices are different. To continue in a work environment I was not enjoying was



something I could do something about. Those who continue treatments against cancer are choosing to continue the fight.

When it comes to this virus, it is a health challenge that humanity must continue fighting. I'm aware there are disagreements about it, but I have landed solidly in the "do no harm" category throughout the last year. The news this Spring in our region has been encouraging. Miami county was among the first hit in Ohio, so we went through the second wave sooner. I am convinced that the time and care we have invested into that care has not been wasted. Multiple local congregations went through "spread events" that we were able

> to avoid, by the grace of God and by the ways we watched out for each other.

I want to believe this is nearly over, and yet I am reminded that viruses are like cancers in that they don't "care" if we are tired of them. Like the cancer patients I've known through the years who go through occasional tests to assure it is still gone, or the same size, it is possible we as a culture will be

dealing with and testing for this virus and its varients for some time to come. I will be pleased if I end up being wrong.

Regardless of the way we word this season we have endured, this virus has become a very visible exercise in perseverence. It is my prayer that the worst is behind us, but as other countries struggle even now, I am reminded to press on longer, to do what I can to continue to be part of the solution, no matter how tired I am of mask acne (3). Despite the varied views, I do appreciate the kindness this church family has had with one another. Up to this point you are living into the mark that Jesus said would let the world know who His followers are...by the love had for one another. Thank You.

May we continue to persevere through this trial, and the next one, and the next one, until our faith is made sight, and the crown of life promise is fulfilled.
