



# A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR God, the Original Artist

Exodus 35:30-35 30 Then Moses said to the Israelites, "See, the LORD has chosen Bezalel son of Uri, the son of Hur, of the tribe of Judah, 31 and he has filled him with the Spirit of God, with skill, ability and knowledge in all kinds of crafts--32 to make artistic designs for work in gold, silver and bronze, 33 to cut and set stones, to work in wood and to engage in all kinds of artistic craftsmanship.

While I cannot say for certain this passage is never quoted, I feel it certainly is not going to be one that is used on bookmarks and bumper stickers. This is a part of the conversation between the Lord and Moses and the Iraelites as plans for the Tent of Meeting or Tabernacle were being

established. If you read through the breadth of the passage, you will notice throughout the reading how much the Lord cares about the skill being put into this work. In this passage, there were specific persons singled because of their particular expertise. Notice how the skills were about being able to make artistic designs, and artistic craftsmanship.

I have been distressed over the last decade or so in the communities I have served when I have noticed school budget cuts almost always start with the arts. It is the art class, the woodworking, the choir, or the band that takes the hit before the more "academic" areas. Now to be fair, I was far more skilled in science, grammar, and mathematics than in anything artistic, but I also had a fascination for those who had such gifts. Most congregations I have served included artistic folks who were able to express their gifts. Nancy Kinnison was one of those who first came to mind when I thought of "artistic." She would be in the hallway with fabric pieces and letters and lacy stuff and "voila," a hall banner for the season was there on the bulletin board. My mind does not work in that way.

I am quite thankful this West Milton region has such appreciation for the arts, even when it surprised me at times. I remember sitting wide eyed at a choir concert seeing the students suddenly break out into dance...all while still singing! That was new for me. Kellie Mahaney is yet another artistically gifted soul our community has lost. And yet, the investment of artistic people in our community still is carried forward. Even now I think about 3 Hoffman graduating seniors, Cody, Kyleigh, and Dane, how each one has a love for art in various forms, impacting their future goals. The Annual Art Show returns to the church calendar at the end of July, and I am reminded yet again of how this congregation gets to nurture this love of art in multiple ways.

I think deep down, especially here, we are aware that art and artistic beauty does not originate with us, but with God. Even as a flower recently bloomed by our side door (pictured), I thought about multiple times in the last few weeks I have referred to the beauty of Spring, of nature, of life, ALL God's

> artistic handiwork on display. The Old Testament writers wrote songs about God's artistic gifts in the world around them, and the New Testament writers painted pictures with words to help us imagine a life to come. Should it be any surprise then how many of history's most treasured pieces of art have been inspired by God, either directly or indirectly? From statues to paintings to architecture; from poetry

to classical music, hymns, and praise songs, humanity has offered praise to God through the gift of art, a gift to be treasured and nurtured, at least in my estimation.

How marvelous it is that we can enjoy the beauty of nature, as well as the beauty captured by the abilities of our fellow human beings, and still give thanks to the Original Artist. I am aware of all the ugly things going on in the world, but today I invite you pause an extra moment or so when "art" catches one of our senses. It may not be essential to life, but I believe it may be a part of what makes life worth living. It may also help us realize how the people around us, and we ourselves, are part of God's magnificent handiwork. While finding beauty in the art of rock n roll, am.

### **Pastor's Report**

The Pastor's report was given with March average attendance; total 116. 9:00 averaged 34 in person and 33 online. 11:15 averaged 24 in person and 23 online. Miami Valley district and conference grant money has arrived. PTZ Optics 30x camera with HuddleCam controller have been purchased, connected for testing, but will be implemented after wiring issues are solved. Additional money was awarded for replacement microphone; more research will be required to make the best purchase. Becky is planning for VBS this summer, July 18-22 to insure safety. She has enjoyed the recent children's attendance during the children's message. Becky is brainstorming an alternative for Lunch Bunch this summer, eg "mobile pantry".

She is in leadership for JTI, May 22, single day event for 6 th - 7 th graders. Bulldog Bags are being packed at Hoffman which is problematic for student volunteer schedules. Ignite has started backup, 12 youth and an adult volunteer, all ages middle school and high school together. The first draft of the picture directory should be available soon. Teen volunteer for worship service operations has been excellent in giving another person able to operate online services. In planning for the 2022 budget the CCLi subscription needs to move from the Music budget to Media Subscriptions budget line. Robbie's vacation scheduled for July 26-August 8, with Tim Benkert pulpit fill confirmed Aug 1 and Tom Weeks confirmed for Aug 8. Tim Benkert has also confirmed he will assist with emergency funeral coverage for August.

### **Trustee Update**

The handrail and landing in the basement has been completed. Secure offering mailbox has been installed. The stained glass restoration project is 51% funded. The board approved for the trustees to move forward with obtaining updated quotes for the total project. The wood supports of the rooftop HVAC units need to be replaced. Additional boiler replacement quotes have been obtained. An alternative is to replace the rooftop

HVAC unit for the sanctuary with a dual heat and AC unit.

### Finance

The finance report for March was reviewed. The weeks of operations or "budget need in cash", is now 6.89 weeks. The endowment fund has had a good return gain.




