A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

Juggling towards Hope

Romans 5:1-5 Therefore, since we have been justified through faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have gained access by faith into this grace in which we now stand. And we rejoice in the hope of the glory of God. Not only so, but we also rejoice in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; perseverance, character; and character, hope. And hope does not disappoint us, because God has poured out his love into our hearts by the Holy Spirit, whom he has given us.

Recently I was able to join an ardent crew of youngsters at one of our local library's many summer programs for the first time in 3 years. Juggling first came into my life at my first apartment in

Chillicothe. I was surprised to find a use for it in Chesterhill, as one of the teachers there used it as a reward opportunity for students who were caught up with their assignments. When I returned to Chesterhill to visit the Fireman's Festival while I served in the District Office, I was shocked when one of the firefighters working at the grill looked up, saw me, and shouted "hey Pastor Robbie" as he spontaneously grabbed 3 salt shakers and started juggling them at the grill. I admit it warmed my heart to see a young adult sharing a skill that I was given opportunity to share at his elementary school so many years earlier. I have through the years developed a few instructional highlights for kids to keep in mind while learning to juggle. They build on each other much like the wisdom shared in Romans 5.

The Fail: No one likes to fail, but nothing worthwhile comes easily, and by necessity will require that we experience failures small and large on the way to learning any new skill, including juggling. Those mistakes along the way, and how we adapt and overcome them make possible the end result...our Suffering produces Perseverance.

The Toss: In my opinion the most important part of juggling is mastering the toss. Many times new jugglers focus on the catches, stretching their hands out in all directions to complete the exchanges, but reaching out wildly makes the next exchange that much more difficult. Good tosses are what make the exchanges add together. Usually when reminding children of the importance of the toss, I will mention that we sometimes "toss"

ourselves in all kinds of bad situations; moments when we don't think through how difficult the recovey or the "catch" will be. Many of my most regretable moments have been situations I "tossed" myself into. Also, the toss is often the easiest to skip or ignore because it is tedious and mundane...it is boring. Doing the same toss over and over again, it really gets old, but when the exercise is done well for enough times, one is no longer thinking about "catching" anything, it is caught without thinking. But, just like anyone who has grown weary of playing the scales on a musical instrument, or grows tired of doing the right thing when so much wrong is all around her or him. Perseverance leads to Character. The Eyes: For most of my life, multiple people have advised me to "Focus" more (something not as simple as simply choosing to

> do so, I hope you know). Well, I get to turn the tables in juggling, because if one focuses too much on one object, the other items are likely to be dropped. It is about being able to recognize the larger picture; seeing all that is being kept in the air.

The Happy Place: This is about our mental state. While sometimes temporary anger can help us accomplish a single arduous task, for the most part there is nothing I have accomplished more skillfully through anger. If something is supposed to be a fun activity for us, we may find it necessary to remind ourselves of that, or our progress in the skill will suffer. Character leads to Hope.

The Future: In juggling there is the ever-present question of what to juggle next. Almost all changes in juggling items requires re-evaluation of the toss.

At some point I decided I wanted to graduate to juggling pins, which added spin and rotation into the toss mechanics. There were many fails spanning years, even over a decade, before I was able to juggle the pins. I didn't succeed until just before my first library program presentation after moving here. Three years ago I stepped up to fire torches...of course. I've only juggled the fire torches when lit twice, both times now in front of a crowd of kids. One could say it is my way of understanding that Hope does not Disappoint.

While remembering Hope does not disappoint...and adding "don't juggle salt shakers" to my juggling instructions, I am, In His Service and yours,

A list of technology items purchased over the course of the last 2+ years was compiled for the trustees. The decision has been made to not have a mission trip this year. It was also recommended that regular updates be given to the congregation regarding the status of LifeWise Academy.

Trustees report was given along with the financial report. Capital Improvement offering was down.

The new projector was installed; the sump pump was replaced in the downstairs children's classroom and a new toilet was installed in the Nursery bathroom. Upcoming projects include: install wood platforms under the units on roof, paint the storage garage (quote has been obtained), mulching and tower room refurbishment.


