A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

Messy Stories

2 Chronicles 34:1-3 Josiah was eight years old when he became king, and he reigned in Jerusalem thirty-one years. He did what was right in the eyes of the LORD and walked in the ways of his father David, not turning aside to the right or to the left. In the eighth year of his reign, while he was still young, he began to seek the God of his father David. In his twelfth year he began to purge Judah and Jerusalem of high places, Asherah poles, carved idols and cast images.

This summer marks the start of our 8th year together. I have a hard time believing so much time has passed. In 2015 my daughter was just ready to start 6th grade, and my son 2nd grade. She starts at Kent State this fall as he enters high school,

gulp! A lot can happen over the course of 7 years. A lot has happened over these 7 years together.

Just for fun I thought I would look through the Bible and see if there were any significant events that happened in the "8th year." It would have been more fun if we had a story about Jesus in his 8th year, but we don't. The Gospels jump from the birth narrative to the family's escape to Egypt. and then to Nazareth, and then nothing is written until his trip to Jerusalem with his parents at the age of 12. Unfortunately, most anything that relates to an 8th year is associated with kings. And while I think my birthday should be a royal

holiday, it is a big stretch to connect our history to the history of kings. In my research I noted that Nebuchadnezzar was in his 8th year as ruler of Babylon when he invaded Israel and exiled the Jews. While that is interesting:-)

The account of King Josiah occupies a soft spot in my heart. As soon as my research came across this story I remembered as a child at my home church in Vinton County how there were children's books of various characters and accounts all throughout the sanctuary, at the ends of the pews. I have a few hazy memories of going through those on a Sunday morning. trying to decide which story I wanted to read about during the service. I only can remember a couple of the storybook titles, but one was "The Pearl of Great Price," and the other was "Good Little King Josiah." Josiah was 8 years old when he became king. In the 8th year of his reign he started actively pursuing the ways of God. This means he was around 16 years old when he started taking his faith more seriously. It might be more accurate to say

he started taking his God more seriously. By the time he was 20, he started removing from the kingdom of his rule all the carved and the cast idols that were in place from years past. Now, his zeal for this work included burning the bones of priests that served other gods on their altars.. I'm pretty sure I didn't read that in that children's book so long ago.

This is true of many great stories, isn't it? I have more than a few stories I have told through the years. I used to hold back part of the story due to a slight embarrassment factor, but in recent years have tried not to do that, as the story is less genuine if I leave out those elements that made the moments "real." I admit I miss the simplicity of those books of my childhood. A story about

> an interesting character and the good things they did, capped off with a moral for our everyday lives. Nice and simple. Our lives are not so simple, and our own stories many times include personal failings and broken relationships that make our stories "messy." One of the many things I appreciate about the Holy Scriptures is that humanity is and has always been complicated. I hate to tell you this, but it is true of our institution, and national histories, as well as even our own congregational history. There usually is some part of our history we would prefer not to tell. Our beloved country's history includes

moments that are certainly messy. One of the stories I share in membership class is the messy history of Methodism by way of the Angligan Church and a king wanting a divorce that the pope would not grant, so the king made himself head of a new church. So messy! Despite our collective and individual messy stories. God has continued to work with and through humanity. Josiah is one of the few shining examples in the Old Testament of a king who actively sought God. I pray our zeal for serving God always stays focussed on Him, and not on our ideal of what we think it should look like to serve God. The difference may be hard to spot. It is easy to set our eyes on the messy institutions under God, rather than simply on God. Maybe those simple books of my childhood were more helpful than I thought. While trying never to forget Who I serve, I am,

Mission and Ministry

Janet reported on the 53rd Annual Conference. There were 8 recommendations that required action.

Recommendations passed by the conference included:

Amendments to rules of the Annual Conference

Budget for 2023

Board of pensions and health- no changes

Equitable compensation increased minimum salary by 3%

Reducing the number of districts in West Ohio to 6
Support for conference delegates to endorse amicable separation for Local Churches and Annual
Conferences

The recommendation to consider candidates for ordained ministry regardless of their sexual identity failed to pass.

The conference closed 8 churches, but also started 18 new faith communities representing 2300 new worshipers. The Conference has given >\$250,000 to Ukraine. We ordained 12 elders, 4 deacons, 3 provisional deacons and 5 provisional elders. In addition, 54 clergy retired.

Pastor's Report

The attendance for May 9:00 am 58.2 (-5 vs April) (in person) and 15.6 (-8) (online) 11:15 62.8 (+4) (in person) and 4.2 (-2) (online). Miami Valley District Spring Meeting went well. Pastor Robbie delivered cards to Rev Dr. Roper to celebrate retirement and welcomed Rev Dr. Wilson. Mission trip has been canceled. Pastor Robbie is giving a talk at the Dayton Women's Emmaus retreat in July. Two new banners for the July 4th parade are available and will hang in the activity center. Robbie participated in the library summer programming with a juggling presentation. Robbie has completed his required sexual ethics training offered by the conference.




