A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

Exodus 17:10-13 So Joshua fought the Amalekites as Moses had ordered, and Moses, Aaron and Hur went to the top of the hill. As long as Moses held up his hands, the Israelites were winning, but whenever he lowered his hands, the Amalekites were winning. When Moses' hands grew tired, they took a stone and put it under him and he sat on it. Aaron and Hur held his hands up-- one on one side, one on the other-- so that his hands remained steady till sunset. So Joshua overcame the Amalekite army with the sword.

We have come to the end of another calendar year. Personally, I am stunned how quickly time seems to go by. I know from some of our conversations that this is a common occurrence, particularly as we get more, ahem, seasoned.

Moses was called into service as an octogenarian, so he was of a certain vintage, one could say, by the time of this battle. We are told that at the end of his life Moses had clear eyes and mind, but I'm certain his body had limited strength. Whether or not we have a complete understanding on why the army fought better with his arms raised, I think it is fair to say that without help, the

battle likely would have been lost. You migh notice there is no mention of Moses arguing against assistance.

It is amazing how the argument of young children "I can do it myself" can be a repeated argument when we are on the downslope of the metaphorical "hill," "I can do it myself" when the younger versions of ourselves intervene in our actions. The irony would be comedic were it not so frustrating.

The difficult truth is that we need help in all seasons of our lives. Even in Genesis the Lord declares it isn't good for humanity to go it alone. It was the first moment in creation that was Not good, and in nearly every translation of the original text, before the use of the word spouse, husband or wife, the word for the second one to be created included some understanding of a helper. While it isn't in the text, I wonder if Adam might have or would have argued, "I don't need anyone, God. I named all these animals myself. I think this is a pretty good gig going on here, so why add unnecessary drama with someone else?" Still, it is

noteworthy that it is God, not Adam, who declared a helper is needed. It is God who declares that it is not good to be alone.

We have multiple ministries at work at various times here at Hoffman. Sometimes I'll try to compliment the coordinator, but often what I hear back is "I have a great team of workers/helpers who make it possible." There is a maturity in such a response, to understand that while things can be done by one person working hard, a team of people can accomplish so much more.

As 2022 is ending, I'm finding myself particularly reflective, as over the last couple years there have been a wide variety of transition with multiple persons stepping into different roles in the church. Thank You. There have also been those who have learned new skills and filled in doing entirely new things. Thank

In addition, if I'm honest with you, there have been multiple times over the last couple years when I have felt a different kind of exhaustion; different from simply a physical tiredness, and I have wondered how to continue. In those moments a little hope goes a long way. It is remarkable how often that hope came in the form of a shared article, or forwarded joke, or a simple text

> or note of encouragement, or volunteering to do something brand new. While not as physically dramatic as arms being held up, each moment was a reminder that I am not alone in this, and we all together help bear one another's burdens. (Galatians 6:2).

For all the ways that you have helped with the burdens of the faith family here at Hoffman, of neighbors, and even of mine and my family's.., Thank You. I pray God continues to bless this congregation's work through your words and deeds as we enter this new year.



Grandma's Kitchen, 2022

Thanks to all the volunteers—and diners!—who helped Grandma's Kitchen have another successful year. We were 'open' 14 weeks and served 2941 meals; of those meals, 895 were given to families in need. Even with prices going up on just about everything we use, we still managed to support Grandma's Kitchen financially without raising the cost of our meals. This was possible due to the number of diners who have returned since our very limited meal schedules in 2020 and 2021 and to a number of donations. We were able to make a donation of our own as we contributed \$500 to help those affected by the floods in Eastern Kentucky.

We had 54 volunteers who gave almost 1000 hours of service to Grandma's Kitchen including such chores as peeling potatoes (80# at a time), wrapping silverware, delivering meals, bussing tables, dishing up ice cream, cutting pies, making/packing salads, shopping for food, washing dishes, serving beverages, bagging up carry-out meals, doing laundry, packing leftovers and taking them to the Family Abuse Center, dealing with repairmen (unfortunately), planning menus, helping seat diners, keeping track of the finances, sharing a joke and a prayer, serving at the steam table, cooking noodles, browning meat, mashing potatoes, opening cans (actually, that can be a time-consuming job!), moving hot, heavy pans into and out of the ovens, baking brownies/cakes, subbing for whoever whenever, etc. And this doesn't include any of the 'unofficial' jobs, such as visiting with our guests, which makes Grandma's Kitchen such a good place to be on a Wednesday evening. Our volunteers are the key to making this whole program work.

If you haven't already done so, you may want to take a moment to read the engraved plaque on the south stained glass window in the South Towers Room. That window is dedicated by Grandma's Kitchen "in memory and honor of our founders, volunteers and patrons" which represents over 20 years of service to our church and community. Thank you to all who have helped in any way with Grandma's Kitchen, 2022, and to those from years past who had the vision, desire and dedication to support and maintain this program.

Two Women's Bible Studies Planned

The Wednesday Morning Women's Bible Study will begin again on January 11, 10-11:30 a.m. in the Multi-Purpose Room with the first of two planned Bible studies. The first study is a Lenten study, *Lent in Plain Sight: A Devotion Through Ten Objects* by Jill J. Duffield, which is a daily devotional with questions and reflections for each day. Ash Wednesday is February 23 this year which means we will be finishing our study as Lent, 2023 begins. The hope is that this daily study will be a good way to start the year and to help us be better prepared when the Lenten season begins. All women are welcome to join the class; you need not be a member of Hoffman nor attend church here.

God works through ordinary people, everyday objects, things we bump up against moment by moment. The question is . . . do we have the eyes to see God's near presence and the ears to hear the word of the Lord spoken? Can everyday objects remind us to stay awake and pay attention? In this devotion Jill J. Duffield draws readers' attention to ten ordinary objects that Jesus would have encountered on his way to Jerusalem: dust, bread, the cross, coins, shoes, oil, coats, towels, thorns, and stones. In each object, readers will find meaning in the biblical account of Jesus' final days. Each week, readers encounter a new object to consider through Scripture, prayer, and reflection." (Amazon.com)

The second Bible study, *God Works All Things Together for Your Good: Living in the Promise of Romans 8:28* by Robert J. Morgan, is scheduled to begin March 1. Robert J. 
