A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR Taking Care the Lumps We Leaven

Matthew 16:5-8 5 When they went across the lake, the disciples forgot to take bread. 6 "Be careful," Jesus said to them. "Be on your guard against the yeast of the Pharisees and Sadducees." 7 They discussed this among themselves and said, "It is because we didn't bring any bread." 8 Aware of their discussion, Jesus asked, "You of little faith, why are you talking among yourselves about having no bread?.

These last few weeks have been a whirlwind. I had the privilege of being a part of the ordination steps for future clergy

in our denomination, and the next week had the blessing of gathering with clergy peers for a spiritual renewing type of service, the first in-person gathering such as this since 2019. I did not realize I had missed them so much.

With conversations about membership recently, some may not know that clergy are not members of individual congregations. Instead, we are members of

the Order of Elder or Order of Deacon. In local congregations, people can be members of the same church most of their lives. For clergy, we "miss out" on that possibility. While our relationships with congregations have limited timetables of maybe a few years, or maybe many years, we are part of another congregation, a fellowship of workers in different areas of the vineyard for our Lord. And, that relationship is one that is continuous for the length of our careers, usually.

The passage I have above is one I have reflected on often, and I even have a youtube video about it, from a time when my hair folicles were more difficult to count. The disciples and Jesus had embarqed, and the disciples realized they had not brought bread along. Bread is and was much more of a staple in the Middle East, and serves both as something to eat on its own and as a utensil for eating something else. As one who enjoys dipping things, I appreciate that use.

In the midst of their absent mindedness, Jesus starts using bread language, "be on your guard against the yeast (leaven) of the Pharisees and Sadducees." They heard Jesus, but they didn't really hear Jesus. They heard his words and assumed he was talking about their forgetfulness, but he was talking about the teachings of the Pharisees and Saducees. It isn't stated identified the hypocrisy and pride that were under so many of the Pharisee motives, even as they were teaching the Law of God publicly. This did not happen all at once, but over a period of time the prestige of the position, titles, and public honor became very important to them. As far as the people who looked up to them, they followed the Law of God, but Jesus knew they were seeking the approval of people more than they than seeking the heart of God.

immediately in those contexts, but throughout the gospels Jesus

Thank you to all who filled out surveys. There will be a Church Conference vote in the future, watch and listen for details of future information meetings and the eventual vote. The warning of Jesus to beware the yeast of the Pharisees ties into how an entire group can be impacted by a singular thought, whether positive or negative. I think about a "pile on" in which after the first couple persons have jumped on, it is easier for all the others to jump on, until the there is only a pile of humans in which the first person is totally buried. While maybe

some of us have this kind of visual image, others may have an image of comments on a social media site, and how a couple comments become an avalanche of negativity. Or maybe you have watched in person as a group piled on to someone else with their words. The gospels record such an event in the 8th Chapter of John, as a woman caught in the act of adultery was dragged before Jesus. An easy target, since she was guilty, and a crew of people ready for the "pile on." It didn't take much, for a little yeast leavens the whole.

Jesus wanted something different for his followers. He warns them to beware the yeast of the Pharisees. It spreads quickly. Fortunately, it isn't just bad things that spread quickly. Pentecost is a good example of this, and from the looks of it, another good example is the awakening being experienced at Asbury University in Wilmore, Kentucky. Good can spread quickly through the whole, just like the bad. We just have to be careful what pile we jump on. Whether I'm with my oft-distanced clergy congregation, or we are in our local worshipping community, let us be careful what leaven we add to these various lumps…Let's leaven love.
